### MUSIC

The GABRIELI ENSEMBLE (not to be confused with Gabrieli Brass Ensemble) consists of Keith Puddy, clarinet; Keith Harvey, cello; Kenneth Sillito, violin; and John Streets, piano. Together for ten years, each is a distinguished musician in his own right. Mr. Puddy is ex-principal clarinetist of both the LSO and the Hallé, Mr. Sillito is leader of the English Chamber Orchestra, Mr. Harvey was the youngest-ever principal cello of the London Philharmonic

Orchestra and Mr. Streets is Director of Opera at the Royal Academy of Music. The full programme is:

WELSH NATIONAL OPERA CHORALE was formed as a full-time professional chorus in 1968 and spends the bulk of its time participating in the opera seasons. However, it does occa-sionally go on concert tours and this is one such occasion. The programme is very diverse, ranging from Welsh folk songs to Negro spirituals to famous opera choruses.

The BARTOK STRING QUARTET was formed in Budapest in 1957, and is now famous all over the world. They have made many records, including all the works of Bela Bartok, and have appeared at virtually all of the world's famous music festivals. On this occasion they will be playing
