EXHIBITIONS

Instead of our usual one-man show, a group of local artists who work under the name of PENDLE ARTISTS will be in our Burnley gallery this month. They have regular exhibitions in local libraries but this is their first one under our auspices.

Female artists take over the whole of the Artshop gallery during June. Upstairs there is the first ever exhibition by ADRIENNE SEED, daughter of a local publican. 3 years that she spent in the Far East have had a large influence on her paintings. Her formal art training was begun at Blackburn College and recently completed at St. Martins College of Art, London.

Downstairs the exhibition is one of batik paintings by BUFFY ROBINSON and patchwork by HARRIET RICKARD. Both are in their early twenties and both 'Southerners' who have moved North.

MID-PENNINE SCULPTURE AT GAWTHORPE HALL. This small exhibition of sculpture by William Pye, Harriet Freedman, Brian Ord, Andrew Darke, James Griffin, John Farnham, David Berry-Hart, Alma Ramsay and the Welfare State, displayed mainly in the grounds but with some pieces in the long gallery and other parts of the house, has been assembled by the Mid-Pennine Arts Association to show a cross-section of work being produced in Britain today. It ranges from work by well established artists to work by self-taught artists, and artists at the very beginning of their careers. In one instance the work has been produced by a group of artists/performers, The Welfare State, who collectively have built on site the "Memorial to the First Astronaut".

The exhibition is intended to show that sculpture can enrich and complement landscape. It is hoped that visitors to the exhibition may be inspired to suggest to their local authorities or to their employers that they buy sculpture for public places, for all to enjoy. MUSIC

IAN WALLACE is described on his passport as "Singer and Actor". An extremely versatile artist he started as a character actor, was persuaded to go into opera, and now has ten Glyndebourne seasons to his credit as well as numerous engagements with Sadlers Wells, Scottish Opera and Welsh National Opera. "An Evening with Ian Wallace" comprises songs from his varied repertoire interspersed with light-hearted reminiscences and stories about Music and Musicians.

POETRY

Open air poetry readings are a new innovation for us and what better place to start than the beautiful grounds of Towneley Park on a summer's day. **IRVINE HUNT, DAVE GOULDER** and **PETE MORGAN** have all visited our area before separately but on this occasion are combining forces. An evening reading in the Hall itself completes the day.

THEATRE

THEATREMOBILE will be performing "The Three Little Pigs", a rock musical for children, during the first two weeks of July. This highly successful production will be performed in schools throughout the MPAA area, also during these two weeks "The Jam Butty Show", an informal entertainment about Lancashire, will be available for booking by pubs, clubs, etc.

WHITWORTH SCHOOLS EXHIBITION

Together with the Whitworth High School we have decided that as there is to be no Whitworth Festival this year, the gap should be filled with a small scale schools festival, aimed mainly, but not exclusively, at children.

THE PLAYBOARD PUPPETS are well known through their appearances on BBC TV's 'Playschool'. For the Festival they will be presenting a full one and a half hour programme comprising "A Waddle and a Quack", their own version of "The Ugly Duckling", and "Fish and Bits" an underwater fantasy.

Pianist **VINCENT BILLINGTON**, of BBC Radio Manchester, is presenting three versions of his 'Funny Side of Serious Music'. One for primary school children, one for secondary children and one for adults.

DAVID BERGLASS, a magician made famous by television appearances, promises "The Most Unusual Show Ever Presented". A man who has had television series running simultaneously in several European countries, who has privately entertained people such as Churchill, Onassis and Getty and who has duplicated all of Uri Geller's feats must be something special.

THE LANDINI CONSORT specialises in music from the medieval, Renaissance and early Baroque periods. They play genuine period instruments on loan from the University of York. Their evening's entertainment is entitled "Pastyme with Good Companye" and features crumhorns, sorduns, gemshorns, lutes and viols amongst others.

Also featured in the Festival are our own resident civic magicians The Welfare State.
