EXHIBITIONS

Two of our exhibitions this month simply change places. JEFF MERRI-FIELD makes the trip from Blackburn to Burnley and PAT EYRE goes in the to Burnley and PAT EYRE goes in the opposite direction. Pat's exhibition comprises mainly images culled from Sunday newspaper colour supplements, and Jeff has combined with poet Nigel Gray to give a series of impressions of life in a number of different media, including photographs, words, paintings and assemblages. JOHN MULLIN on the other hand is a sculptor in ceramics. He has had a joint exhibition at our Blackburn gallery before but now he is going solo. One of his larger pieces has a permanent home in the foyer of MPAA's Burnley offices.

The selection of pictures is from various sources and the work is by a dozen different photographers, some of them official War Office personnel sent out with the firm instruction "no dead bodies".

David Lloyd, who made his professional debut with no less a singer than Heddle Nash. They will play a different programme at each of the two performances.
