


NWAA Transport Subsidy

Adrian Mitchell is best known as a poet, but he also writes novels and plays. This is his version of Daniel Defoe's famous book "Robinson Crusoe." Crusoe has often been regarded as the Universal Man Alone, cast up on his island with a few implements and his human ingenuity to struggle for survival. Mitchell turns the story on its head and tells his tale through the eyes of Man Friday. The audience are part of Man Friday's tribe and Friday has brought Crusoe back to join them. With the help of songs, dances and sharp scenes of outrageous comedy the audience is asked to join in and decide for or against Crusoe. The play has been shown recently on television, but the dimension of audience involvement is missing in that medium. The music has been written by Mike Westbrook and he and his band Solid Gold Cadillac, who are well known to jazz audiences throughout the country, will be performing live with the company.

The Gibbeting of William Jobling

David Kossoff



6 June to 29 June Sculptures by SAM TONKISS

Sam is the editor of the local Todmorden newspaper, a position he has held for 21 years. He was actually born in Shropshire but came to Todmorden as a teenager. He began sculpting fourteen years ago and his best known work to date is a portrait of Harold Riley, the painter commissioned by Salford City Art Gallery. This led to a flow of work which at times tends to get out of hand.

4 July to 3 August Paintings by DAVE TAYLOR and LANGLEY BROWN

This month we have a joint exhibition by two young artists. They have both studied in Leeds and at Bolton College of Art. Langley had his first one-man show in the Octagon Theatre Gallery, Bolton in February this year. He says his paintings are of ''crystallised anxieties in a landscape" and his collages are of ''the violence of the two-dimensional mass-media." Dave is at present a full-time coffin maker, but intends shortly to become a full-time painter. His work, he says, is influenced by "fruit, the sky and geometry" and he claims "given time I can make a drawing which is perfect as fas as I am concerned." He does, though, admit that it would be gibberish to most people.

8 August to 31 August Ceramics by the YOUNG POTTERS

These five young potters have recently established the Workshop Pottery in Every Street, Nelson. Three of them, Warwick Brindle, Maureen Brindle and John Mullin are former students of the Burnley School of Art. The other two, Dennis Farrell and Michael Paul Rollinge have Wolverhampton Polytechnic in their common background. This will be the first exhibition of ceramics for a long time in our gallery. It should be of interest to all local potters.

Young People's Workshop

We continue with our highly successful series of drama workshops for young people between the ages of 7 and 21. Many children have attended these informal groups, all of which are under the supervision of a trained drama teacher. Wherever you are in the Mid-Pennine area you are near one of our workshops. The next series of ten sessions begins on Saturday, 28th April, except in Burnley where the start is a week later on the 5th May.



Mid-Pennine Centre for the Arts

It has always been the policy of the MPAA to work toward the establishment of a Centre for the Arts in North East Lancashire. We are now able to move closer to the realisation of this scheme, as the site earmarked for the building is already partly clear. So that building may start as soon as the site is available, detailed plans of the theatre as the core of the building have already been prepared, providing for a very flexible theatre to house plays, ballet, opera, concerts and many other activities. Around this central core will be provision for other leisure pursuits such as painting, ceramics, photography and film, as well as meeting rooms and a rehearsal studio. There will of course, be a coffee bar, licensed bar and restaurant, so that those using the building can be refreshed by a meal before the theatre, or a cup of coffee and a chat with a friend during a mornings shopping. The Centre will be for everyone's enjoyment. Open every day from 10 am, it will provide opportunities for discovering more about the arts, for taking part in arts activities. "Ubu Roi" Comedie de l'Ouest

"Ubu Roi"

"Ubu Roi" is a new departure for us, as the play will be presented in its original French text by the Comédie de l'Ouest, one of France's eighteen National Dramatic Centres. It concerns the life and ambitions of Ubu, Captain of Dragoons at the court of King Venceslas of Poland. He is determined to make himself king and sets about achieving this aim in a bloody fashion. The overall design of the production is modelled on the small, open-air circuses which still tour the French countryside. It is, therefore, set "in the round" and so the seating capacity of the hall will be limited to 300. The performance also owes much to its circus-style humour, as one French newspaper said, "The CDO has made a festival of its "Ubu Roi" and Roger Guillo (as Ubu) displays a magnificent talent for clowning."

An Exhibition of Paintings by John Bratby

John Bratby has recently been elected a Royal Academician, after being an associate of the Academy since 1959. He was born in Wimbledon in 1928 and studied at Kingston College of Art and the Royal College of Art where he won several scholarships, including one awarded by the Italian Government.

In 1956 he exhibited at the Venice Biennale and was awarded the National Guggenheim Award. In 1957 he won first prize in the junior section of John Moore's Exhibition.

Fluxshoe

Fluxus is an art movement which is much influenced by the Dada movement of the inter-war period. It's most famous exponent is probably Yoko Ono. The movement emerged ten years ago and the artists involved have only performed or exhibited their work in this country, notably the Destruction of Art Symposium in 1966. Fluxshoe is the first major presentation of Fluxus in the country as a whole, outside London.

I Musici Di Roma

I Musici were described by Toscanini as "the world's finest chamber orchestra," when they were founded in 1952. Many people in the music world still hold this opinion. The original twelve members met a students in the Santa Cecelia Academy in Rome and have been together ever since. They have revived long-neglected musical treasures, the heritage of almost forgotten Italian composers of the 17th and subsequent centuries.

Their repertoire, however, is by no means restricted to this period, as they have made several fine reordings of music by 20th century composers. The Orchestra consists of six violins, two violas, two cellos, a double bass and a harpsichord. The programme they will be playing is:

Street Life of London 1870
