### **NWAA Transport Subsidy**

### **Opera**

OPERA FOR ALL, an Arts Council Promotion which comprises three fully professional touring opera companies, is now in its twentieth season. Its productions are staged in costume and are sung in English to piano accompaniment. Mid-Pennine audiences will remember with pleasure the excellent —and very entertaining—performances of Rigoletto, The Marriage of Figaro and Cinderella, presented in the area by these companies last year. This year, the programme will be as follows:

### MANON: music by Massenet, libretto by Meilhac & Gille

The opera is based on the well-known and everpopular story by the Abbé Prévost, which is chiefly remarkable for the skilful way in which the two sides of Manon's character, the child and the courtesan, are portrayed. The warmth and beauty of Massenet's music illuminate this tragic story of the Chevalier DesGrieux's love for Manon, from their first meeting in Amiens to their final farewell on the road to Le Havre.

# THE ITALIAN GIRL IN ALGIERS: music by Rossini, libretto by Anelli

Like Rossini's *Cinderella*, the heroine of this opera, Isabella, is a coloratura mezzo-soprano, a girl whose charm and strength of character are more than enough to outwit the plans of Mustafa, Bey of Algiers, to make her his favourite wife. Musically this early work shows Rossini at his best; comic situations follow thick and fast, and, of course true love triumphs in the end.

#### LANCASHIRE SINGS AGAIN

This show covers very nearly every aspect of Lancashire lore, from pace-egging through clogdancing and folk songs to dialect verse. It is presented by Robert Holland-Ford and performed by Lancashire's top professional entertainers. Harry Boardman has been singing folk songs since the early fifties, and was the first singer seriously to research the songs and traditions of Lancashire. Accompanied on mandolin and banjo by his wife Lesley, he has made many television and radio broadcasts; and he records for the Topic label. The Oldham Tinkers, who also record for Topic, are a group of young men who combine robust singing with accompaniments on guitar, banjo, mandolin and penny whistle. Harvey Kershaw is the leading living writer of Lancashire dialect verse, who regularly gives recitals of his verse, not only to dialect societies, but also in the folk song clubs, where he has a great popular following. Also appearing are the Moston Brook Clog Dancers, organised by Jim Mainland.


MARTIN MILNER (Leader: Hallé Orchestra) MARIE REIDY (Soprano and Harp)

The programme for this special recital has yet to be finalised, but Mr. Milner hopes to include sonatas by Handel and César Franck and a group of Paganini Caprices; Miss Reidy's programme will include songs with piano accompaniment and folk songs to her own harp accompaniment.

Martin Milner, leader of the Hallé since 1958 has led the orchestra in over 2,000 performances. He has frequently appeared as soloist with the Hallé and has made several guest appearances with other orchestras. Born in Bolton in 1928, and trained at the Royal Manchester College of Music (where he obtained his Performer and Teacher Diploma with distinction), he became, in 1946 a first violin of the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra at the invitation of Sir Thomas Beecham.

Marie Reidy studied (initially singing, later the harp) at the Royal Manchester College of Music at the same time as Martin Milner. She has sung with him often, and has also performed with such artists as Owen Brannigan, Leon Goossens and Evelyn Rothwell. She is a frequent broadcaster, and gives lecture/recitals on the harp and folk music to Music Societies throughout the country. She is married, and now runs a music business in Blackburn with her husband.

### **One Woman Show**

#### SALLY MILES in THE RUINED MAID

Sally Miles, daughter of Bernard Miles and Josephine Wilson, was born over a pub at the World's End, Chelsea. A very talented singer, actress (she has worked in television comedy with such artists as Peter Sellers, Michael Bentine and Benny Hill) and director, Miss Miles has worked frequently at the Mermaid Theatre in Puddle Dock, and in 1961 she founded the famous Margate Stage Company with Gerald Frow. This company produced some of of the most exciting and original theatre seen in England for many years. It is as a solo performer, however, that Sally Miles is best known—particularly for her one-woman show Love to Kill, to which THE RUINED MAID is a successor.

THE RUINED MAID is about the anticipation, the enjoyment, and occasionally the heartache of being ruined. The programme—bawdy, sophisticated, tender and frequently very funny—is composed of songs, ballads and poems sung and spoken to guitars. Some of the material is old. Some, by Miss Miles herself, is new. Most of it is very English—there are some surprisingly saucy poems by Thomas Hardy. But some—harsh bittersweet songs by Brecht for example—come from Europe. In short, THE RUINED MAID, in terms of personality, music and material, is a highly original programme for a very entertaining evening.

Well known to audiences in the Mid-Pennine area, the Manchester Mozart Orchestra decided, earlier this year, that it was no longer possible for it to continue giving orchestral concerts without financial assistance. The orchestra is a great asset to the region, and the North West Arts Association is pleased to be sponsoring four concerts this season, of which this is one.

Charles Groves was born in London and became a chorister at St Paul's Cathedral at the age of eight. In 1951 he was appointed conductor of Bournemouth Municipal Orchestra and in 1954, he formed the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra, which rapidly gained a considerable reputation as one of the national symphony orchestras of this country. He was awarded the OBE in 1958 for his services to music, and after leaving Bournemouth in 1961, he became Musical Director of the Welsh National Opera Company. Since September 1963, he has been Musical Director of the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra.

Barry Tuckwell, who is the soloist in Mozart's Horn Concerto No 4, was born in Australia in 1931 and studied at the Sydney Conservatorium. He now lives in England and was until recently principal Horn with the London Symphony Orchestra. He has an international reputation as one of the world's foremost horn virtuosos, and has won the highest acclaim for his appearances in the USSR, Sweden, Holland, Germany and indeed nearly all countries of the world.
