### **NWAA Transport Subsidy**

The North West Arts Association offers transport subsidy to parties of 8 or more people resident in the North West attending a professional event in the region, or any other event considered eligible at the discretion of the Association, and travelling by public transport or hired bus or coach. The claim can be made from the NWAA, on presentation of a receipt for the actual cost, for 50% of the total transport cost, provided that the return fare is more than 5/- per head. The NWAA reserves the right to refuse a subsidy towards the costs of transport, and it should be noted that the scheme is a privilege of membership of the NWAA (Associate Membership minimum subscription is one guinea per year). 

# THE MID-PENNINE GALLERY 28 Back St James Street, Burnley

The Mid-Pennine Gallery, in the Mid-Pennine Association suite at 28 Back St James Street, was opened on 12 November 1969 by Dame Edith Evans. The Gallery houses small one-man exhibitions, which are changed monthly, and which present only work of the highest quality. Furthermore, we hope that the very reasonable prices charged by our artists will encourage many more people to buy their work (in the case of more expensive works, we can sometimes negotiate payments by instalments). So why not come and browse, completely without obligation. At present, the Gallery is open Monday to Friday 10 am – 12 noon and 2pm – 5 pm, and by appointment. We hope to extend these opening hours as soon as possible.

# **Exhibition**

### KORTOKRAKS: Paintings and Drawings

Kortokraks was born in 1928 at Ludwigshafen-am-Rhein in Germany. He attended art schools in Austria and Germany from 1942 to 1948: he has painted ever since, and teaches occasionally. For 10 years he lived in Paris, but since 1965 has made London his home. In 1969 he travelled extensively in Mexico and the USA.



In 1968 and 1969 he had one-man shows at the Sezession, Vienna; the Staedtisches Museum, Trier; the Kunsthalle, Bremen; Galeria Pecanins, Mexico City; Casa de la Cultura, Guadaljara, Mexico; and the Herbert Benevy Gallery, New York.

This exhibition presented by the Mid-Pennine Association will be the first major exhibition of his work to be seen in this country.


### YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORKSHOPS



# **Ballet**



### NORTHERN DANCE THEATRE Artistic Director: Laverne Meyer

Northern Dance Theatre is the first ballet company ever to be based in the north west, and the first regional company in the country. It has been formed as the result of an Arts Council "Living Artist Award" made to Laverne Meyer – formerly principal dancer, ballet-master and Associate Artistic Director of the Western Theatre Ballet – to prepare a feasibility study of the region.

Northern Dance Theatre is a small company of 11 dancers, and will eventually have 20-25. The ballets the company performs are existing small-scale works such as *Death and the Maiden* and *Peter and the Wolf*, as well as new ballets by contemporary choreographers. In this way, it presents both new and established chamber works covering a wide range of styles and building a constantly growing repertoire which is both entertaining and stimulating.

Northern Dance Theatre will be an outlet for the talents of dancers, choreographers, designers and composers from the region. Their aim is to develop a company and repertoire which is regional and international in both standing and character.



# Opera

OPERA FOR ALL, promoted by the Arts Council of Great Britain, comprises three fully professional companies which tour throughout the British Isles, presenting performances of the highest quality. Their productions are staged in costume and are sung in English to piano accompaniment. The very enthusiastic response to the performances by the London Opera Centre company in October make it quite clear that OPERA FOR ALL is eagerly awaited by audiences in the Mid-Pennine area; and in this quarter, we are proud to present performances by both the other OPERA FOR ALL companies.

LA TRAVIATA: music by Verdi, libretto by Piave As with *Rigoletto, La Traviata* was written for the Teatro La Fenice in Venice, where it was premiered in the spring of 1853. Based on *La Dame aux Camelias* by Dumas *fils,* the opera tells of Violetta Valery, a leading member of the Parisian *demi-monde*, and the object of Armand Germont's love. She, for the first time in her life, feels that she is in love, and, although suffering from consumption, gives up her life in Paris to live with Armand. His father pleads with her to give up Armand, and Violetta makes this sacrifice. Armand believes that she has betrayed him, and only when she is dying are the lovers briefly re-united.

DON PASQUALE: music by Donizetti, libretto by Ruffini and Donizetti.

This vivacious piece is one of the liveliest of Donizetti's comic operas. The heroine, the young widow Norina, has no reluctance to marry again, provided it can be the husband of her choice and not her elderly guardian.

MADAM BUTTERFLY: music by Puccini, libretto by Giacosa and Illica.

The first night of *Madam Butterfly* was one of the most famous fiascos in operatic history; three months later, however, partially re-written, it returned in triumph and has been a firm favourite ever since (except during the last war, when it was banned from American stages after Pearl Harbour). The opera

concerns an American naval Lieutenant, Pinkerton, who marries his Japanese child-bride, according to Japanese custom for 999 years. She bears him a son, but in the meantime he has gone home and married an American girl. Pinkerton returns, and Butterfly, discovering the truth, kills herself.
