The Mid-Pennine Association for the Arts was founded in 1966. It exists to promote all aspects of the arts in North East Lancashire. It is supported by the District Councils of Blackburn, Burnley, Hyndburn, Pendle and Rossendale, and the Parish Council of Todmorden. It receives financial assistance from North West Arts. It is a non-profit distributing body registered as a Charity.

Offices: MPAA's new premises, open Monday to Friday 9.30 a.m. – 5.00 p.m., Saturday 10 a.m. – 12 noon, shared with TheatreMobile, provide space for booking facilities, a comprehensive information service, rehearsal studio and workshops for TheatreMobile, and both continuous and short-run exhibitions. What can you buy for sixpence?

MPAA recently published a small leaflet with the above title, most of which is now re-printed here.

Six pence will buy you: a small bar of chocolate, a lead pencil, a newspaper, two cigarettes, ¼ pint of beer, 1/12th of a cinema ticket, six minutes at a football match or 365 days of The Mid-Pennine Association for the Arts.

The six local authorities contribute to the Association each year an amount equivalent to six pence per head of population, in return for which MPAA presents a whole range of entertainments including: brass bands; string quartets; pianists; opera companies; theatre companies; folk groups; jazz bands; puppet companies; painters and sculptors; orchestras; and many more. The Association has brought to live and work in the area Atarah Ben-Tovim, TheatreMobile, the Bentovim Ensemble, and the Welfare State. In so doing, the Association has

helped to seed a growing community of artists in North East Lancashire.

TheatreMobile presents a repertoire for all ages, at present including "Macbeth", "Jack and the Beanstalk" and "Private Lives". Much of the company's work is performed in schools, colleges, children's homes and hospitals, as well as in public venues. Last year they took the name of North East Lancashire to Bulgaria and Germany.

Atarah Ben-Tovim now runs the Children's Concert Centre in Haslingden, and is currently engaged in television and radio shows. For MPAA she performs children's concerts, band concerts, concerts with the Bentovim Ensemble, and a whole series of lunchtime and evening recitals with other musicians.

The Welfare State are based at Heasandford, and apart from performances and community projects in North East Lancashire, they also provide regularly a giant bonfire for Burnley on November 5th.

These above are the artistes that MPAA has brought permanently into the area — and that is only one part of the near 300 promotions given each year.

The actual cost of maintaining Mid-Pennine activities last year was £106,000 of which £75,000 came from sources including Central Government Funds and £31,000 from six Local Authorities. This latter figure represented the levying of a 1/20th penny rate. Some of the authorities feel that, because of the need to economise, they should withdraw their financial support from MPAA. Yet if they all withdrew the total saving would be £31,000, or sixpence per person per year. And this would mean that the Central Funds would cease to come into the area, so that North East Lancashire would lose £62,500 of national money. In other words, for each six pence per person saved, an extra fourteen pence will also be lost for the area.

What this means for North East Lancashire is that all the activities described here would cease, and that there would be no locally-based, professional organisation to ensure that the area gets its share of central funds for the arts.

The Association was created ten years ago by the people of North East Lancashire, for the people of North East Lancashire, and particularly for the young people. Do you want your children to grow up in an area devoid of the arts?

(Music)

As usual, our music programme offers a wide variety of material, with Atarah Ben-Tovim, String Quartets, a Brass Band, Guitar and Piano Recitals, and a jazz event. Listed here are some of the more unusual elements, all very different, and of a very attractive nature.

To kick off the Spring Season we have an amazing evening's entertainment at TODMORDEN Town Hall, Sunday 9th January 7.30 p.m. Pianist Walter Landauer teams up with singer John Boulter to provide a Cavalcade of Music and Song. These two artists are each highly successful in their own right, and both have displayed an amazing range of musical abilities in their past careers. As a result, we are promised an evening of many different styles, including classics, film music, show songs, and modern songs. Walter Landauer has toured most of the world, performing in clubs, concerts, cabaret, variety, television and radio. His most recent tour was with Moira Anderson and Ivor Emanuel. His stage-act is highly amusing, and includes a great deal of talk "about his wonderful career!". John Boulter was classically trained at the Royal Academy, and has used that to augment his singing in many diverse styles. He has starred in over 300 TV shows, including The Black and White Minstrels, in over five thousand West End theatre performances and has broadcast on Radio 3 and "Friday Night is Music Night". He has even toured opera with the Arts Council! His lively personality and sense of humour will make the evening unforgettable. Both have recorded L.Ps.

A complete change of mood occurs at St. John's Church, ACCRINGTON on Saturday, 15th January at 7.30 p.m., when the Musica Reservata perform. This should be a particularly popular concert, with the new upsurge of interest in mediaeval instruments. Musica Reservata is directed by Michael Morrow, and uses two voices (mezzo-soprano and tenor), viols, rebec, flute, crumhorn, and sackbut, to play a programme of 15th and 16th Century music. The members of the ensemble are Jantina Noorman, Edgar Fleet, Cat Mackintosh, Daphne Webb, Bernard Thomas, and Trevor Herbert. They will play works by Dufay, Frye, Compere, Tromboncino, Pifaro, and Des Prez. Arising out of the Director's researches into early instruments, the singers and instrumentalists had to learn new techniques to produce the sounds he believes to be authentic, sounds totally different from those of the Baroque period.

And yet another brand of music for Burnley and Blackburn in February. The Scholars will be giving two concerts, one for each town, and their blend of voices is unique. The programme will include Madrigals by Morley and Byrd, Music from the Court of Henry VIII and songs from the New National Songbook. Five finely balanced voices with dedicated teamwork produce a

perfect sound. Their repertoire now covers over 500 years of European music, ranging from mediaeval through to jazz. The members of The Scholars are Elaine Barry (soprano), Nigel Dixon (counter tenor), Robin Doveton (tenor), Michael Leighton Jones (baritone) and David van Asch (bass). The performances they will give for Mid-Pennine are:-

With the added attraction of the Church setting, these are performances not to be missed.



Back to TODMORDEN again, for a performer who needs little said about him. Mike Harding, the Rochdale Cowboy, plays Todmorden Town Hall on Sunday, 6th February, 7.30 p.m. This Manchester-born, Yorkshire Dales-resident, has over the last ten years, worked his way through folk clubs, colleges, theatre, radio and television, and is now an extremely popular artist both live and on record. His big break came last year with the hit single "The Rochdale Cowboy" and since then he has had two sell-out tours and a Top 20 album. His show will reflect his own unique brand of humour, using songs and monologues to create a comic world where the laughter is "a reaction (to) a very unfair society". Book your tickets early for this - it's bound to be popular.

At OSWALDTWISTLE Town Hall, Saturday, 12th February, 7.30 p.m., the Yorkshire Chamber Opera perform a concert production of Rigoletto. It will be performed with piano accompaniment and in modern dress. This group have performed all over the North of England, and at several music festivals. Responses from press and audiences alike have invariably been extremely favourable.

And finally, another extreme switch, to early music again, with the Landini Consort at BURNLEY Central Library on Wednesday 16th February, 7.30 p.m. The Consort perform mediaeval, renaissance and early baroque music on replicas of the original instruments, and believe in stressing the "popular" nature of these styles of music. The members are Richard Hill (counter tenor), Nigel Robson (tenor), Peter Syrus (director), Elizabeth Liddle, Margaret McCaul and John Bryan. They utilise crumhorns, comamusen, kortholts, racketts, rauschpfeife, shawms, dulcians, recorders, gemshorn, portative organ, rebecs, viols, mediaeval fiddle, baroque violin, lute, citole, psaltery and percussion. "This team can master a diversity of styles and idioms and infuse them with life." (Daily Telegraph)

(Brass Bands)

In TODMORDEN at the Town Hall on Saturday, 26th February, 7.30 p.m., a fine brass band, the C.W.S. (Manchester) Band, which has enjoyed over a half century of music making and today has a reputation as a concert combination which is second to none, performs. It has a consistently successful contesting record and has now firmly established itself with a wide circle of devotees, not only in the U.K. but also abroad in Switzerland and Canada. They have made nearly 300 broadcasts, several television appearances and recorded some 150 titles. This is undoubtedly one of the finest brass bands in the country.

(Jazz)

On Thursday, 3rd February, 8 p.m., MPAA join again with Hyndburn Jazz Club, this time to present a great American jazz pianist, Dick Wellstood, at GREAT HARWOOD Sporting Club. Dick started his career in the early 1940s with Bob Wilber's Wildcats, and worked extensively with Bob Wilber for the next decade. He then served his apprenticeship playing with such giants as Sidney Bechet and Jack Teagarden, performing all over the U.S. More recently he has toured as a soloist in England, South Africa and Germany. He has many albums out under his own name, and has also recorded with Sidney Bechet and Roy Eldridge. He directed two albums by Odetta and played on Bob Dylan's first L.P. Indeed, he is noted for his unusual versatility, being at home with many different styles of music. Yet his main interest still lies in mainstream and traditional jazz, specialising in ragtime piano. At the same venue in GREAT HARWOOD, on Thursday, 17th February, 8 pm, Mike Westbrook performs with his All-Star Brass Band. Extremely well-received earlier in the area at Barnoldswick and Nelson, the band offer an unusual musical cabaret, with a repertoire that includes hymns, marches, jass classics, improvisations, comic songs, pop favourites, and many of Westbrook's own pieces. Line-up is piano, baritone horn, tenor horn, soprano and tenor sax, trombone, trumpet and vocals.

(Recitals)

In the next three months, MPAA presents music for piano, guitar and voice. Firstly, the concert by Michael Rippon and Josephine McKimmie scheduled for December and cancelled due to a last minute illness of a singer with Pierre Boulez and the Orchestra de Paris, whom only Michael could replace, will now be presented in the Art Gallery, BLACKBURN, on Friday, 11th February, 7.30 p.m. Michael Rippon's achievements are many: in opera he has worked with all the major English companies, appeared on TV and Radio, and performed with the major National Orchestras. He records for EMI, Decca, Pye, and Deutsche Gramophon. The programme includes Purcell, Handel and Vaughan Williams.

Anthony Goldstone returns to the MPAA area to give a series of three concerts on our new Steinway piano in the Central Library, BURNLEY. Since his appearances for us last year in Blackburn, he has gone from strength to strength, giving many concerts at home and abroad — recently as the soloist in the last night of the Proms. In this series he will illustrate three different aspects of music, as follows:-

Fri.28 Jan. 7.30 p.m. "BEAUTIFUL SHAPES" Vivaldi, Beethoven, Mozart, Brahms

Fri.11 Feb. 7.30 p.m. "SCENES AND MOODS" Janacek, Debussy, Liszt, Mussorgsky Fri. 4 Mar. 7.30 p.m. "COUNTRY MUSIC" Gershwin, Hadjidakis, Chopin, Mompou, Kodaly.

There are season tickets for the three concerts combined.

Our final piano recital will be given by the beautiful Japanese/American pianist Hiro Imamura who recently delighted audiences in Nelson. Since then she has given recitals in London and the USA, and played with orchestras including the RPO and NPO. At BURNLEY Central Library on Wednesday, 30th March, the programme includes Haydn, Beethoven, Prokofiev and Chopin.

To complement our piano recitals, we once again welcome the classical guitarist Leo Witoszynskyj. To his many friends in this area he will need no introduction. For those who have not yet had the pleasure of hearing him, a brief resume: born in Vienna in 1941, he studied with Luise Walker, Andres Segovia, and Narciso Yepes. Since winning the first International Competition for Guitar in Alessandria in 1968, he has given concerts all over the world, and has broadcast and appeared in many International Festivals. In between his many concerts, he makes records and is Professor of Guitar at Graz. He will play concerts in PADIHAM, RAWTENSTALL and ACCRINGTON between 10th and 13th February. (See Calendar)

(String Quartets)

This season features two performances by the internationally acclaimed Chilingirian String Quartet. The first of these is on Wednesday, 12th January, at the Central Library in BURNLEY, 7.30 p.m. The quartet is resident at the University of Liverpool, and have often toured internationally. The members of the quartet have a fine curriculum vitae which includes coaching from the Amadeus, study at the Royal College of Music, and study at the Yehudi Menuhin School. "One of the best string quartets in this country." (Daily Telegraph) The programme at BURNLEY Library will be: Haydn Quartet in D minor Op.76(2); Britten Quartet in C No.2 Op.36; and Schubert Quartet in G major Op.161 D.887. In February the Quartet return, this time to BLACKBURN, bringing with them Singer Jane Manning. In 1973 she received a Special Award from the Composers Guild of Creat Pritain for

Manning. In 1973 she received a Special Award from the Composers Guild of Great Britain for her services to new music. A regular performer at the Proms, she does not concentrate entirely on new works. Miss Manning has sung in many operas, and her performances include works by Purcell, Handel and Bach. Having sung all over the world, many of her recordings are issued abroad as well as in the U.K., and her broadcasts for the BBC alone now number over 250. This performance at Blackburn Art Gallery on Monday, 28th February, is part of an Arts Council Contemporary Music Network Tour. Tippett Quartet No.1; Hugh Wood Quartet No.2; Schoenberg Quartet No.2 with soprano.



(Exhibitions)

1977 sees the first exhibitions in the programme of the MPAA's new Gallery at Hammerton Street. The Gallery is open daily between 9.30 a.m. and 5.00 p.m. and on Saturdays between 10.00 and 12.00 noon. The programme of exhibitions will not be as regular as before, since the Gallery is used also by TheatreMobile as rehearsal space. However, immediately after Christmas, the Welfare State will be mounting a large scale exhibition, open to the public from 12th to 22nd January. See Page 12 for full details. Following this, from 21st February to 12th March, Bob Frith will be showing work that he created for the Bede Gallery, Jarrow. Bob Frith is wellknown in the Mid-Pennine area, particularly for his series of works based on a portrayal of the village of Helmshore. Together with two of his students, Eve Ropeck and Rob Dobson, he created an enormous structure at Jarrow, the building of which took six weeks, and was an integral part of the exhibition. Bob himself describes it as "a three-dimensional sculpture in which the sculptors themselves were an essential element". In Burnley, the exhibition will be in three sections; firstly there will be a documentary display of the Jarrow event; secondly some fragments and costumes from it; and thirdly, work which was inspired by it. Between 23rd February and 2nd April two other exhibitions will be mounted. Full details will be announced in local press.

This historic country house has permanent displays of 17th Century furniture, ceramics, 18th and 19th Century paintings, natural history, militaria, and archaeology. 
