NWAA Transport Subsidy

Parties of eight or more people, normally resident in the North West region, and travelling by public transport or hired bus or coach to any event organised by the Mid-Pennine Association for the Arts, may claim 50% of the total transport costs provided that the return fare is more than 1/6d per person. The Association is always extremely grateful for the




THE SPINNERS

With well over 400 radio and television performances behind them, and regular sell-out concerts at Manchester's Free Trade Hall, there can be no possible doubt that The Spinners are this country's most successful folksong group. They are largely responsible for the resurgence of the folk song as an important voice in the musical life of the country. They write: 'From being regarded (and therefore shunned or ridiculed) as the province of school teachers and country parsons dabbling in the quaint songs of jolly rustics, more and more people have come to realise that Folk spoke a living language of guts, rebellion, historic and contemporary comment, satirical, comic or tragic.' The danger of popularisation is that folk too easily becomes folksy in the hands of the exploiters: it is greatly to the credit of The Spinners that they retain their integrity in the face of a vast popular following, deriving their repertoire from the grass roots throughout the British Isles and the West Indies.

THE BARROW POETS in pubs

The Barrow Poets (the name derives from a time when they wanted to sell poetry broadsheets from a street trader's stall, but were unaccountably refused a licence by the London authorities) are already widely known for their frequent performances at festivals, on television, in pubs, and in London's May Fair Theatre and Queen Elizabeth Hall. They command a rapidly growing public of no particular social category, and form an important element in the great upsurge of public interest in poetry.

The group has been together for about five years, held together by a passionate interest in poetry, music and entertainment, and by a belief that these three are totally compatible. They believe that poetry is written not only to be appreciated in the silence and privacy of the home, but also to be enjoyed in the company of others. Their lively performances constitute a happy blend of the bizarre and the conventional, the old and the new, the great and the tiny — with much territory between these extremes.

Their scripts include works by Shakespeare and Spike Milligan, Chaucer and Dylan Thomas, Ben Jonson and Rudyard Kipling, with music by Handel and Gershwin, Bartok and Hoagy Carmichael, and many others.

These informal entertainments will be presented, in conjunction with Massey's Burnley Brewery Ltd, in public houses throughout the Mid-Pennine area. Watch local press and posters for details of the venues.

ARTHUR NEGUS on Antiques

One of the most popular figures of British television — through his regular appearances as resident pundit on BBC/tv's *Going for a Song* — Arthur Negus has, through his sensitive appreciation of fine objects, introduced millions of people throughout the country to the sheer pleasure which can be gained from the artistry and craftsmanship of former generations.

Arthur Negus, who will be returning to other towns in the Mid-Pennine area area later in the year, will discuss items of old furniture, porcelain and silver (not less than a hundred years old) which are brought to him by members of the audience. He will not see the pieces in advance, and will have no prior knowledge of what there is to discuss. He will endeavour to give his reasons for deciding whether or not the items are genuine. If you have an item which you think will merit his discussion, please write, giving as much detail as possible, and preferably a sketch as well, to the Mid-Pennine Association for the Arts. We will forward all letters to Mr Negus's agents, who will then decide which items should be discussed.


