General information

The Mid-Pennine Association for the Arts was founded in 1966. It exists to promote all aspects of the arts in North East Lancashire. It is supported by the District Councils of Burnley, Hyndburn, Pendle and Rossendale, and the Parish Council of Todmorden. It receives financial assistance from North West Arts. It is a non-profit distributing body registered as a Charity.

The Association presents over the year a whole range of professional entertainments including brass bands; string quartets; pianists; opera companies; folk groups; jazz bands; puppet companies; painters and sculptors; orchestras; and many more. MPAA has brought to live and work in the area Atarah Ben-Tovim, TheatreMobile, the Bentovim Ensemble, and the Welfare State. It has also initiated the Artsquad and a Puppet Company.

MPAA is not a grant-aiding body, but it is willing to give advice to artists and organisations seeking aid.

Offices: MPAA's premises, open Monday to Friday 9.30 a.m.—5.00 p.m., Saturday 10 a.m.—12 noon, shared with TheatreMobile, provide space for booking facilities, a comprehensive information service, rehearsal studio and workshops for TheatreMobile, and both continuous and shortrun exhibitions.

Associate Membership: A number of those who support MPAA's work do so by taking up Associate Membership. This costs £2.50 per year, and brings the Member a free seat for three different MPAA events in the year. (The Membership Card cannot be used for joint promotions). The Scholars: a personal view

The Scholars return to Burnley on Wednesday, 14th December, to sing at St. Peter's Church, at 7.30 p.m. The programme includes Italian and English Madrigals, sacred music, music by Henry VIII, folk songs, and some lighter pieces. Here Keith Daniels, well known in N.E. Lancs. as a Radio Blackburn presenter and producer, gives a personal view of a Scholars concert he attended at Blackburn Cathedral last year.

I'm sure that anyone who has seen and heard The Scholars in concert will view their return to Burnley in December with a good deal of pleasurable anticipation: and for those who have never been to one of their performances, I can say that there's a real treat in store.

I first heard The Scholars in Blackburn Cathedral and still fail to understand why there was such a small audience: the setting was ideal, - The Scholars standing in an informal group on the chancel steps - the accoustics were perfect, and the repertoire, although perhaps a little rarified for some, introduced the audience to a wide range of music from the medieval to the modern. When attending any concert or recital I favour a repertoire which includes some familiar items, so that I can guarantee to enjoy at least some of the proceedings, but I also like to have my horizons broadened; this The Scholars did to perfection not only with their choice of music but also because they told us a little about the songs, particularly those sung in Italian, so that we could derive the maximum enjoyment from hearing them. Some concerts tend to drag a little because performers are slow to assess their audience, but when The Scholars came to Blackburn last Winter they demonstrated their ability to judge their audience almost immediately and a rapport was quickly established which lasted for the whole performance.

It's eight years now since The Scholars established themselves as one of Europe's foremost vocal ensembles. In 1973 when they visited Vienna they were hailed as "The Sensation of the Season" and time and time again the critics have described their singing as "Immaculate". The Scholars' unique sound consists of five finely balanced voices, each easily discernible and yet all blending to produce superb precision singing. Originally consisting only of male voices, the ensemble took its name from the fact that each singer had been a choral scholar in the world famous choir of Kings College, Cambridge; having given several successful concerts whilst still at Cambridge, The Scholars decided to continue singing together as professionals. In 1972 they expanded both their numbers and their repertoire by introducing a female voice, and Shelagh Molyneux certainly adds greatly to the group's appeal.

In the last two years The Scholars have given concerts in Australia, the Far East, the U.S.A. and Canada, West Africa and Jordan and we are fortunate indeed that they'll be returning to St. Peter's Church in Burnley in December to provide another delightful evening for the people of North East Lancashire.



Changes at TheatreMobile

Miss Gloria Parkinson, TheatreMobile's Artistic Director for over 5 years, has left the company to take up an Arts Council Writer's Bursary. David Pammenter is the man to take over her arduous task of directing this local touring company. Peter Dewhurst, a local reporter who works for the Evening Star, interviewed him to find out what effect this would have on the company.

David Pammenter — TheatreMobile's new director — believes the role of any theatre company is to put over a message. That is why he feels the content of plays is of vital importance.

"I like my theatre to have something to say" he explains. "I am very much a contents based person."

For that reason one of his first productions with TheatreMobile will be "Example: The case of Craig and Bentley" which was written by his former company, the Belgrade Theatre in Coventry. It is an insight into hanging based on the strange case of one of the last men to die by the noose in Britain.

Pammenter spent seven years with the Belgrade, the last five as head of the theatre-in-education department which was responsible for taking drama into the 170 or so schools in the Coventry area.

Virtually all of his time was spent working with children, although the group did do some work in the theatre. That experience of mobile theatre has equipped him for the sort of work he will do with his new company.

He will be running an almost rebuilt Theatre-Mobile, for the actors are almost all new. He is a believer in equity and democracy, and everyone in the company, including himself, will be paid exactly the same wage. He is also determined that each member will have a say in the way the company works.

"I want to get the company as democratic as is humanly possible," he commented. "I like to get people with a high degree of skills. I feel wage differentials are divisive. And giving everyone the same wage means that everyone is on a fair wage. If a subsidised theatre can't pay people for working they should demand more or close."

Like his predecessor Gloria Parkinson, he believes in home grown material, and the company will continue to use a lot of their own plays. His wife Sue Johnston is an actress with the Rochdale based M6 theatre, and they live in Whitworth.

David hopes to co-devise material with M6, and Messrs. Robinson and Holman will probably do some writing for both companies. "I think worksharing of this kind will be useful," he said.

He feels, too, that the North East Lancashire area's rich history will provide useful background, without becoming exclusively Northernist.

TheatreMobile has always been involved with schools, and Mr. Pammenter feels there is room for a free theatre-in-education service. He wants to present issues to children in productions written for their own age-group.

He plans to work with two or three classes at a time, rather than with whole schools, and adds that pretty well all the material will be specially written by the company.

He will continue the idea of using musicians with the company and at Christmas he plans to put on a musical production of "A Christmas Carol".

Mr. Pammenter was born in Bristol and trained at St. Luke's Teacher Training College, Exeter, in drama and English. He spent a number of months in Canada, taking part in summer schools before joining the Belgrade.

A Quartet with a difference

NORMAN CLARK reports

The Lindsay String Quartet come to Burnley Central Library on Tuesday, 25th October, 7.30 p.m. The members of the quartet are Peter Cropper, Ronald Birks, Roger Bigley and Bernard Gregor-Smith, and they present a programme of Bartok, Debussy and Beethoven. Norman Clark, free-lance music critic for the Burnley Express, previews the concert.

The quality which stands out from all the material acquired about the Lindsay String Quartet in preparation for this article is the dedication of the players.


They do not, as so many other quartets, choose for their programmes two or three major classical quartets, and then insert a short modern work in the middle somewhere as a gesture, but make a feature of getting inside the compositions of composers such as Bartok and Tippett, and indeed, their performances of the Bartok String Quartets have become the template against which others are measured.

The Lindsay String Quartet was formed in 1966 at the Royal Academy of Music. After scooping all the prizes available to them this success led to an invitation to Budapest where they began their detailed study of the Bartok Quartets.

They were then awarded a Leverhulme Fellowship to become Resident Quartet at Keele University for a three year period which eventually became five as their growing reputation resulted in an increasing number of engagements here and abroad.

In 1972 they accepted an invitation to take up residence at Sheffield University, helped by assistance from the Yorkshire Arts Association.

In 1973 they toured Italy for the first time, and later that year were the British representatives at "Interforum 73", a showcase for young artists in the Esterhazy Palace in Hungary. Their particular success with Bartok's Quartet No. 3 foretold the acclaim they have since received for performances of the complete cycle of six (three quartets on each of two successive evenings), and for performances of individual quartets, Number 3, which is in their Burnley programme, is perhaps the most human of the six and falls easiest on ears tuned to the classic period.



Lindsay String Quartet

The Lindsay stands high among the Quartets which have emerged during the past decade. An opinion that young musicians are not able to interpret the subtle depths of (say) late Beethoven would seem to be unfounded prejudice, or perhaps it is that music lovers of an earlier inhibited generation would have it so.

Debussy enjoyed concealing the construction of his works by making it difficult to trace the framework around which his scores were built. In his only String Quartet (he had promised another, but never wrote it) there is an impression that he is attempting the richest variety of effect from the smallest material. The Andantino is specially so, where the embryo of a theme is gradually built up as the various instrumentalists join to embellish the original.

The programme will also include the fourth of the six early Beethoven Quartets Opus 18. The key of C minor is usually a key for drama and tension in Beethoven's music, but whilst this is the most vigorous of the set and makes the most direct appeal, it is lyrical and flowing in style.

(Recitals)

Our recital programme this season encompasses a wide range of forms, including guitar, piano, and voice. However, as the latter is such a specialised field, we have detailed that area of the programme separately under the heading of Opera/Song on page 7 of this magazine.

- * Neil Smith Guitar. Civic Theatre, NELSON. Tuesday, 27th September, 7.30 p.m. Programme includes works by Bach, Tarrega, Barrios, Villa-Lobos and others a wide ranging period from 16th century to 20th century. Although a young musician, Neil Smith has given many recitals throughout the U.K., and done a lot of TV and Radio both here and abroad. He has also given many recitals in North East Lancashire. "A young guitarist with a very fine technique distinguished yesterday's recital by his immaculate playing" DAILY TELEGRAPH.
- * Richard Stalker Piano. Haworth Art Gallery, ACCRINGTON, Sunday, 30th October, 8 p.m. Programme: Beethoven Pathetique Sonata; Prokofiev Sonata No. 3 in A minor; Chopin Fantasie Impromptu Nocturne in E flat, Op. 9, No. 2 Three Waltzes Polonaise in A major, Op. 40; Sibelius "Kyllikki" Lyric Suite; Granados Allegro De Concierto. Another young musician, Mr. Stalker was born in London and won a bursary to the London College of Music. He has given recitals in England and Belgium.
- * Martin Roscoe Piano. Central Library, BURNLEY. Wednesday, 9th November, 7.30 p.m. Programme: Mozart Sonata in B flat K.570; Schubert Sonata in C "Unfinished"; Debussy Images Series II; Schoenberg 6 Little Pieces Op. 19; Schumann Davidsbündler Tänze Op. 6. Martin Roscoe is well-known to audiences in North East Lancashire, and has already performed for us at Burnley Library. He is on the North West Arts Young Musicians Platform and as a result of this his reputation is being greatly enhanced regionally and nationally. A fine player he also manages to combine popular pieces with less well-known ones in his programming.

(Opera/Song)

In this area of our programme we bring new young singers such as Sarah Duncan-Shorrock and the Sharps onto the same platform as more established artistes such as John Watts and Michael Rippon.

*The Life of Mozart with John Watts and David Ward. Haworth Art Gallery, ACCRINGTON. Sunday, 2nd October, 8.00 p.m. Using their combined experience of theatre and music these two performers portray Mozart's life in a delight-

- ful evening using letters, stories, songs, and piano music. Last season they presented the Life of Beethoven at the same venue, and it was a thoroughly enjoyable performance.
- *The Magic Flute presented by the Yorkshire Chamber Opera, Empire Theatre, BACUP, Friday, 4th November, 7.30 p.m. This is a concert performance with piano accompaniment, yet if their recent performance of "La Traviata" at Oswaldtwistle is indicative this will be a stunning and very involving rendition of one of Mozart's greatest and most charming operas.
- * Michael Rippon accompanied by Josephine McKimmie, Civic Theatre, NELSON. Friday, 18th November, 7.30 p.m. Mr. Rippon is a very well established operatic baritone who has sung with all the major opera companies and appeared on many broadcasts and recordings. Their last performance locally was in Blackburn, and the audience there found themselves delighted by an evening of operatic arias and traditional English songs. Michael Rippon is not only a fine singer but also a marvellous entertainer.
- * An Evening of Opera and Song given by Miss Sarah Duncan-Shorrock, Haworth Art Gallery, ACCRINGTON, Sunday 11th December, 8.00 p.m. Born in 1953 this young soprano presents a fine recital of Christmas music, including carols, traditional Christmas songs and festive works by Bach, Handel, and Mozart, amongst others. Miss Duncan-Shorrock hails from N.E. Lancs. and studied in Manchester and London.
- * Janette and Jennifer Sharp present their own Christmas recital at the Civic Theatre, NELSON, Tuesday, 13th December, 7.30 p.m. These two young and attractive singers made their MPAA debut at the Haworth earlier this year. The concert was broadcast by BBC Radio Blackburn and was so successful that this return performance is a must. They are both from Burnley and many will remember their performances before they departed for music college. This programme includes works by Handel, Bach, Thiman, and Britten, with some carols and oratorio.
- * The Scholars, St. Peter's Church, Burnley. Wednesday, 14th December, 7.30 p.m. SEE PAGE 4 FOR FULL DETAILS. The Scholars are a fine vocal quintet and they present a programme of sacred music, Tudor and Elizabethan music, English and Italian Madrigals, and folk songs. They are Shelagh Molyneux (Soprano), Nigel Dixon (Alto), Robin Doveton (Tenor), Michael Leighton Jones (Baritone), and David Van Asch (Bass). They have always received a fond welcome in this area and since their last appearance here we were pleasantly surprised to see them on BBC-TV's "That's Life".

(Dance)

*The Alexander Roy London Ballet Theatre, Municipal Hall, COLNE. Sunday, 9th October, 7.30 p.m. Joint promotion with Pendle Leisure Services.

ALEXANDER ROY is of French-Polish origin and began his career at the State Opera in East Berlin. He later joined the 'American Festival Ballet' on tour. Seasons followed with the Nederlands Dans Theatre and the London Dance Theatre for whom he mounted his first major work 'Circuit'. Alexander Roy then formed the 'International Ballet Caravan', which became the LONDON BALLET THEATRE. He has created more than forty works for this company as well as mounting ballets for other European ballet companies. During the current season the company will appear in London for two major seasons and besides touring throughout France, Italy, Switzerland and Britain will undertake its third overseas tour to South East Asia.

The company will perform "About Face" inspired by Shostakovitch's Trio, and "Nepentha", a self-devised piece conceived out of the strange social contrasts extant in the late 1960s. "The presentation is highly competent" — Daily Telegraph.

The programme is: Haydn Quartet in G Major Op. 76 No. 1; Mozart Quartet in G Major K387; Smetana Quartet in E Minor "From my Life".

Tuesday 18th October, 8.00 p.m. Henry Lowther (trumpet, flugelhorn and violin), Stan Sulzmann (tenor and soprano saxophones, and flute), Trevor Tomkins (drums and percussion), Phil Lee (guitar), Chris Laurence (bass). Although the common ground is jazz, the band's music is as varied as one would expect from musicians with such wide experience and background. The individual members, all of whom are acknowledged as being amongst the very finest musicians working in Britain today, work not only in the jazz field, but also in other areas of music. 



The Gallery at Hammerton Street has been well used over the summer months, and the autumn programme brings further enjoyment for those living in and close to Burnley. Two major exhibitions before Christmas show the work of local artists of repute.




