Lord Eccles has concisely stated the principle: the Mid—Pennine Association for the Arts is concerned to make that principle a reality in the area it serves.

What the Centre is

- for YOUR enjoyment.
- easy to get to. Just opposite Burnley Bus Station, and close to good parking facilities.
- open seven days a week, from 10.0 a.m.
- multi-purpose. You can watch a film or play,
 read a book, have a meal, paint a picture, chat
 develop your holiday snaps or your interest in early music,
 all under one roof.
- for people of all ages, occupations and interests.
- a powerhouse, able to provide the area as a whole with increased arts activity locally and centrally.
- a place for now, a place for the future, where children and grandchildren of today will still enjoy themselves with their children.

Design of the Centre

The design strategy for the Mid-Pennine Cenre for the Arts is based upon extending public involvement in two ways:

Firstly, by providing professional production facilities tor the M.P.A.A.'s own arts programmes. These activities will radiate from the Centre into the surroundingtowns and villages; Secondly, by providing facilities for public use so that interest can develop into participation.

The many directions in which the Centre may develop in the future cannot be determined at this stage. The Centre must therefore represent a flexible statement of intent into which diverse interest can be injected at different points in time.

Theatre is a multi media art form involving many professional skills. Therefore as a nucleus upon which many other art forms can react and from which they can extend, theatre forms the focus of the Centre both spectators and participatory activity.

The flexible arrangements of the auditorium once defined remain constant. Services to the building in terms of administration, catering, air conditioning, lavatory provision etc. are also calculable. These two elements therefore form the linear core to the building alongside which all other production spaces and multi-purpose areas can be set, to connect, expand or change function as time and growth dictate.

PROSCENIUM STAGE

The stage in this arrangement can be used for opera and ballet performances, drama and musicals. It can be used for conferences or public meetings, and concerts. The 'trapped' area covers an orchestra pit.

THRUST STAGE

Though this form of staging is more usually associated with drama, there is no reason why this cannot be used for music, or modern dance.

THEATRE-IN-THE-ROUND

Again, a form often associated with drama only but one which can be most successfully used for folk concerts, informal revue-type shows, fashion shows or spectaculars.

TELEVISION

The drawing showing the theatre in use as a television studio is one indication of the many uses the theatre alone can have. As we now have local radio stations, and increased use of local facilities by national television companies, (of Bolton's Octagon folk shows) it seems likely that this will increase in the future, hence we provide for it.

RADIO

Assuming the continuance of local radio stations, provision for a studio is envisaged in the building.

REHEARSAL STUDIO

Positioned at the back of the main auditorium, this area has a number of uses. The resident company can rehearse incoming productions, as can any touring company using the theatre. Drama workshops sessions for schools and young people can be held here, and the studio can become a small auditorium for events such as experimental plays, recitals, jazz concerts etc. Like the main auditorium, it will have moveable blocks of retractable seating.

GENERAL TECHNICAL INFORMATION

As yet, this can only relate to the theatre, as the development of other arts facilities is still in the planning stage.

Given the adaptibility of the theatre, there are a number of general technical details that will be of interest to amateur societies in particular, and the public in general.

For proscenium staging, there are full flying facilities planned. On other forms of staging, some flying is possible, though proportionately less, as will be seen from the section and plans.

Provision has been made for an orchestra pit for ballet, opera and musical productions.

The ancillary facilities of a theatre such as dressing-rooms, workshop, wardrobe and laundry, and rest rooms will be of the highest possible standard of comfort.

The main auditorium seating is on large moveable blocks which are retractable; this is the means by which the three forms of staging have been achieved, and it is intended that the auditorium can be quickly cleared to a large open area, which could be used for a banquet or flower show.

As at present planned, it is possible to vary the seating capacity of both the performance areas to accommodate activities

The lighting and sound equipment will be the best available. The bridges spanning the performance area and the side galleries running round the two auditoria will provide easy access to all lighting units and will enable equipment to be positioned quickly to cover any part of the auditorium. The stage lighting and sound control units will be in a box above the performance areas, giving the operators a clear view of the stage.

The control box will also house cinema projection equipment, television cameras and control equipment, Closed circuit television and sound will be relayed to all parts of the Centre.
