And some measures of success:

- Halo was adopted by the Northern Way as part of Welcome to the North, a select programme of iconic public art projects across the north of England.
- Singing, Ringing Tree won a string of awards from RIBA, Structural Steel Design Awards and more.
- Atom won a national Civic Trust Award 2008.
- For the Panopticons project, MPA won the Arts Council's Art o7 award in the Totally Inspired! category, one of four for work around the North West.
- MPA was named Creative Business of the Year 2008 in the BIBAs, Lancashire's business awards.
- Turnover topped £750K for the first time. Two thirds was generated by projects and fundraising. MPA generated a small surplus on the year's activity. This will be carried forward and invested in our programme. MPA maintains modest reserves in line with stated policy to insulate the organisation against the unexpected.

MPA AND EDUCATION

All our work is underpinned by a commitment to creative learning. MPA has a longstanding track record of work with schools, and our outstanding education team have had their busiest year yet:

- Built up our role as a key delivery partner for Creative Partnerships Lancashire. Support from CPL helped us consolidate our staff team.
- Work for CPL included special relationships with certain schools including Whitefield Infants and other Pendle schools, and Haslingden High in Rossendale. These long-term partnerships have enabled some exceptional creative work.
- A regular programme of activities offered to all our 200 plus local schools.
- Professional development and networking opportunities for our local teachers.
- 76 projects and 618 sessions of activity.

KICKING LEAVES

Kicking Leaves is the biennial celebration of children's literature led by MPA. The publication from the last festival set young people's own work alongside a story commissioned from leading writer David Almond. The book launch at Burnley Youth Theatre was a delightful event shared by 150 young people and their families.

Kicking Leaves returns in winter 2008, another packed programme of inspirational activity delivered with an alliance of partner organisations.

ART AND LANDSCAPE

Dramatic hillscapes set right alongside our towns... These are Pennine Lancashire's greatest assets, and they offer rich material for creative work. MPA has developed a specialism.

Over five years of the Land project, for East Lancashire Regional Park, we have built up a strong network of partners, and an ambitious body of work. Land has concluded, but we are just getting started...

The new Brun Valley Greenway links Burnley's canalside areas to another heritage gem at Queen Street Mill. Partnership with Lancashire County Council enabled a commission of very distinctive waymarkers from sculptor John Merrill.

Leading willow sculptor Serena de la Hey created the Land Giant at Crow Wood, by Junction 11 of the M65. This imposing sixteen foot figure, willow on a steel frame, is another unique landmark for Pennine Lancashire.

Projects conceived through Land, and developed over time, continue to unfold. This has been made possible in part by support from Arts Council England North West.

Partnership projects now taking shape include:

- The Shoe Trail, new link from Rawtenstall up to the Halo site.
- Valley of Stone, a major programme for Rossendale's old quarries.
- New landmark sculpture and outdoor classroom at Croft Top by the A56.

And a new joint venture with the LCC Remade programme will bring a creative dimension to derelict land sites and local people in locations across the county.

PANOPTICONS

Launched in 2003 to support East Lancashire's Regional Park initiative, our most ambitious ever project has this year come to a thrilling conclusion. Three new landmarks were in place. In 2007 we delivered the most ambitious commission, Halo in Rossendale.

Halo was supported by the Northern Way as part of the Marketing the North to the World programme, one of a select few iconic projects across the north of England.

The County's Remade derelict land programme attracted over £400K of extra investment into the site at Top o' Slate. Landscaping of this former tip was followed by construction of Halo's steel frame and lighting array, and the new landmark was unveiled in late 2007.

Halo's launch also celebrated the wider Regional Park programme. The event was devised with the international company WildWorks. Over two weeks, they engaged more than one thousand local people in workshop sessions, tea parties, and creative contributions to a unique, community-led celebration.

An extensive supporting programme included an evaluation project with young people from local schools, who made their own, uplifting film of public responses to the new landmark.

Media interest in Panopticons continues to build, with features in Holland, Portugal, Mexico, China and the USA, and growing coverage on websites like YouTube and Flickr.

Halo, by John Kennedy of Landlab, was developed in partnership with Lancashire County Council, Groundwork Rossendale and Rossendale Borough Council.

The partnership programmes Panopticons and Land were made possible by Lancashire Economic Partnership's East Lancashire Regional Park programme and by funds from the Northwest Regional Development Agency. Further support has been generously provided by Arts Council England, North West, Lancashire County Council and the Northern Way.

NEW LANDMARKS FOR PENNINE LANCASHIRE


The project has concluded, but the work continues. MPA aims to maximise the impact of Panopticons, promoting cultural tourism for Pennine Lancashire and helping build positive images.



SPECTACULAR ART FOR NEW PUBLIC BUILDINGS

MPA worked with Hyndburn Leisure Trust and the East Lancashire Primary Care Trust to procure some stunning original work for two major new public buildings.

Opened in spring 2008, the two health centres are landmark buildings and new focal points for Hyndburn, concentrating healthcare provision. The partners recognised that creative arts can transform a healing environment, and asked MPA to commission the work. Support from Arts Council England, North West enabled an ambitious programme.

Open competition resulted in commissions of new, site-specific work from five artists. One major work, by Suki Chan, forms a breathtaking centrepiece for the three-storey atrium at the Pals Centre.

An in-depth study by Susan Weeks of Manchester University has examined the impact of the work, and responses to it, with overwhelmingly positive results. In the Pals, 90% of staff and 85% of users said that they liked the work. 100% of staff agreed that it added character and identity to the building.

MPA aims to contribute to a vibrant, distinctive built environment for Pennine Lancashire. An art commission can make a location unique, and we will prioritise work of this kind.

TALKING SHOP

Regeneration impacts upon people as well as places, and this sequence of projects looks at one key sector. Small, independent retailers are crucial to the vitality of our towns, but in time of dramatic change this is an endangered species.

Talking Shop projects document small shops and the effects on them of rapid regeneration:

- Talking Shop in Accrington looked at the regeneration hotspot of Blackburn Road, working with partners to help involve retailers in the process of renewal.
- Children from ten primary schools explored village shops and created a publication for Talking Shop Rossendale.
- Our project with partners Oswaldtwistle Players has now resulted in a permanent display commissioned by Oswaldtwistle Mills.
- Projects are in development for Bacup and Blackburn, and a countywide programme is taking shape.

Talking Shop has been supported by Elevate East Lancashire, Lancashire County Council and Lancashire County Developments Ltd.

ACCRINGTON

RENEWING PRIDE OF PLACE

Housing Market Renewal brings major investment to the regeneration of Pennine Lancashire, but with it comes huge challenges. For West Accrington, the partners in HMR – Elevate East Lancashire and Hyndburn Borough Council – wanted to make best use of creativity, and commissioned MPA to report.

Our work started with children and families in local schools, exploring their shared past and their hopes for the future. Community groups, local residents, regeneration professionals and artists have all made key contributions. Twelve months' work has resulted in a detailed, sixty-page study.

'Welcome to West Accrington' was compiled with Vista Projects. The report recommends a subtle approach to encourage maximum support... Multiple strategies for tackling key issues, with community involvement to the fore, an emphasis on exploiting the best of local heritage, and a single central aim — to renew West Accrington's pride of place.

Now adopted by the Council, the report provides a tool to help trigger inward investment. Next step, a demonstration programme of a few key ideas... With government eyes on Pennine Lancashire, a few bold, creative actions can put West Accrington right in the spotlight.

The communities in all our towns are culturally diverse. MPA celebrates diversity, and we aim to engage a full range of local people. That includes a long track record of pioneering work with our local, minority Asian communities.

Across our area, councils and community groups are striving to promote social cohesion. All our work aims to contribute to that, and to build better understanding. That has involved:

- Supporting the melas and festivals that bring local people together.
- Joint projects with mela groups and other local promoters.
- Nurturing the Dhamak music project, now established as an independent enterprise. A partnership with More Music.
- Facilitating ELAAF (East Lancashire Asian Arts Forum) as a vehicle for sharing and networking.
- Support for emerging young talent and new community partners.
- Alliance with visual arts agency Shisha to bring an international dimension to Pennine Lancashire.

ELAAF has been supported by Arts Council England, North West. With their help, the network will shortly engage a consultant to advise on organisational development.
