Welcome to our Autumn Term edition of "Full Marks". I hope that you have enjoyed a relaxed and refreshing summer holiday in preparation for the new school year ahead.

The sequence of school-based workshops linked with our Canal 2000 Festival - celebrating the life of the Leeds-Liverpool Canal through the arts - continues with the visits of canal boat artist Tony Lewery to Colne and musician Mary Keith to two Hyndburn schools in September. The climax to the Festival is a night of "2000 Candles" on Saturday 23rd September when there will be a series of 'happenings' close to the Mid Pennine Gallery and the Inn on the Wharf in Burnley.

The central artistic event will be the illumination of a 5 mile stretch of the canal by candle-light. We are hoping to involve at least one Burnley school in the illumination of the "Straight Mile". There will be a showing of a specially commissioned video installation, "The Cut" at the Mid Pennine Gallery as well as music, juggling and other entertainment, hot food, and a firework finale on the canal side. It will be well worth a visit.



Poetry Competition for Schools

Poetry Competition for Schools.

Mid Pennine will again be running a poetry competition in conjunction with 'Pennine Ink' Magazine for children aged between 7 and 13 years old. Certificates and book tokens will be awarded to the winners who will also have the satisfaction of seeing their winning poems published in the Spring edition of 'Pennine Ink', a publication which is circulated to all parts of the United Kingdom as well as the United States!

- Poems can be on any topic, formal or informal in style but should be no more than 30 lines in length.
- Only one poem per competitor should be entered.
- Children from Years 3,4,5,6, in primary schools and Years 7,8 in secondary schools are eligible.
- The name, age, year group and school of each competitor should be written on the back of each entry.
- Individual entries will be accepted but they must include a home address.
- Entries should be sent directly to David Smith at the Mid Pennine Office by November 17th.

'Writing Poetry in the classroom'

a one day course for Teachers - Tuesday October 10th. at the Dunkenhalgh Hotel

This one-day course for teachers, aimed at Key Stages 2 and 3, marks a new venture for Mid Pennine. The course breaks new ground because it will be led by two published, practising poets: Jean Sprackland and Levi Tafari. Places are limited and teachers interested should contact Education Officer, David Smith as soon as possible.

Two Poets in Residence: Levi Tafari and Jean Sprackland.

Both poets have been engaged for 5 days each immediately after the November Half Term Holiday. They are available to spend a full day working in individual schools. It is hoped that each residency will end with an evening of performance poetry presented by the children, hosted by our poets.

Levi has very well established reputation throughout the United Kingdom and Europe for his published work but especially for his performance poetry. The 'Sunday Times' described his work as being highly regarded by other British poets and his performances as "energetic and funny." He is very experienced in working with pupils whether in his home city of Liverpool or in British schools in Germany and other European countries.

Jean Sprackland, poet and former teacher, set up the now well established 101 Community Literature Project in Haslingden, before working with the 'Windows Literature Project' in Liverpool. She is very experienced in working with pupils and is at present deeply involved in a joint DfEE - Poetry Society project to develop training and materials for teachers, called "poetryclass".
