The central purpose of our "Full Marks" programme is to support the development of the arts curriculum in the schools and colleges of East Lancashire. We are able to support you in a number of different ways by offering:

- · a programme of arts activities which you can buy into. The cost is always subsidised by at least 50% and usually much more.
- advice on suitable artists for schools setting up their own visits.
- advice and support for schools making bids for financial support for the delivery of their own approach to the arts. term we supported one local primary school to apply for £5000 to bring artists into the school to work with their children in the classroom.

Thank you to everyone who contacted us last term to make use of our service to schools. We learn a great deal by talking to you, particularly about the kind of arts activities you would like us to provide.

In response to these conversations we will be focusing our summer meeting of the Arts Teachers' Forum on how we can support teachers in nursery and reception classes to deliver arts activities. Forum for Teachers

Tuesday May 16th at 4 p.m. in the Mid Pennine Gallery.

Teachers of nursery and reception classes are invited to talk about what our education service can do to support the delivery of their arts curriculum in their schools and learn a little about what we plan to offer in the near future.

Trail of Words" with Ian McMillan.

May 15/16th and May 22/23rd.

Poet Ian McMillan will be working with pupils from Mount Pleasant and All Saints primary schools in Clayton-le-Moors to create a canal-side "Trail of Words".

Local people, whose lives have been influenced by the Leeds-Liverpool Canal will be interviewed by the children. The tape-recorded results of the interviews will then be used to write poetry and narratives based on the lives of "canal people" on our floating classroom, "The Kennet", which will be moored close to the schools. Pupils from both schools will then share an evening of performance poetry hosted by Ian McMillan.

We are hoping that examples of the children's work will be "cast" into aluminium plaques which will be posted at canal-side sites as a permanent legacy of the project for the general public to enjoy.

"Whirlygigs and Weather Vanes" with Diane Jones

May 15-19th

Sculptural artist Diane Jones will be working with members of the local community and a small group of 16+ students on "The Kennet" moored at the British Waterways Depot in Rosegrove, Burnley.

Participants will learn techniques of using recycled materials to make their own "pieces" before collaborating on the design and construction of a weather vane for "The Kennet".

Creeping Toad" with Gordon MacLellan

June 5-9th.

Environmental artist Gordon MacLellan will be working with pupils from Whitefield Infants' and Lomeshaye Primary Schools exploring canal-life through 'canal-dipping' before using their findings to engage in story-telling, mask and puppet-making. Cost £100 + vat.

Canal Folk Art with Tony Lewery

Sept 4-8th.

Canal historian and artist, Tony Lewery will be working with pupils from Gibfield School in Colne. They will be recreating the traditional canal boat decoration associated with the Leeds-Liverpool Canal on the children's own boat: "The Lancashire Enterprise".

Creating Folk" with Mary Keith and "The Noisy Planet Band".

Sept 11-13th. and 18-19th.

Folk singer, composer and musician, Mary Keith, will be in residence with St. Mary Magdalen's Primary School in Accrington and one other Hyndburn school creating the music and lyrics for new folk songs about people whose lives have been influenced by living alongside and working on the Leeds-Liverpool Canal. The culmination of the residency will be a folk concert in one of the participating schools featuring "The Noisy Planet Band".

Autumn Poetry Residency.

In late Autumn we will be establishing two linked residencies involving two secondary schools and up to eight of their partner primary schools. Writer, Jean Sprackland who set up the Haslingden 101 Literature Project and Liverpool writer Levi Tafari will be the two poets working with the schools involved.

A unique feature of this residency will be that each school taking place will be offered a free place on a one day course at the Dunkenhalgh Hotel in Clayton-le-Moors on "Practical strategies for presenting poetry in the classroom". The course will be presented by the two poets leading the residency.

Planning a strategy for delivering the Arts in your school?

A new publication from the QCA/Arts Council will come into all schools this term. It is called: 'From Policy to Practice'; it is practical, short enough to pick up and read and deals with how to set up an effective strategy across the arts in school rather than treating the arts as seperate curriculum subjects. Ask your headteacher if it has arrived.

"Arts Mark"

As a part of its response to the report: "All Our Futures - Creativity, Culture and Education", the Government has announced a new national arts award for schools: "Arts Mark". The aims are to recognise good practice and to raise the standards of arts education work in schools and in out of hours activities. The scheme will do this by:

- recognising, promoting and disseminating good practice;
- encouraging improvements in standards, and expansion of arts education opportunities;
- raising the profile of arts education within schools;
- encouraging effective partnerships between schools and arts organisations.

A number of local authorities have been asked to nominate schools to take part in a pilot project for the scheme; unfortunately Lancashire is not one of them. Watch out for details as they emerge over the year. If you want more information now, telephone 020 7211 6200.
